

Bishop Albert Jarman, Jr. is a Wilmington, Delaware native and the youngest of three siblings. He is the only son of Archbishop Albert Jarman, Sr., and the late Lillian H. McManus-Jarman. His parents were both educators in the Delaware educational system from which they retired: she from the New Castle County School District as a certified elementary school teacher, and he, a retired Associate Professor of English from Delaware Technical Community College.

Bishop Jarman has served as a church musician and in various ministry positions throughout his lifetime. He is the founder of the nationally renowned Ebenezer Concert Choir that has performed nationally in churches, on stage, and professional recordings. Bishop Jarman's most memorable appearance would be at the White House representing Pennsylvania during the Christmas Holiday. The choir gave such an outstanding performance for holiday tourists that then-President Bill Clinton requested that the choir remain for a private audience with him.

Bishop Jarman, Jr. serves as an advocate for the homeless, disadvantaged, and those whose voice is silenced by the vicissitudes of life. He is an outspoken voice in the communities he serves. He has been a foster parent and still enjoys close relationships with those he raised. He serves on several community boards as advisor. Bishop Jarman is the Presiding Bishop of New Day Interfaith Fellowship of Churches, which serves as an ecumenical covering of congregations committed to lifting the lives of those in need of support regardless of race, socio-economic level, orientation, and status.

Bishop Jarman became physically disabled in 2010 as a result of Lymphedema. His resolve to live life to its' fullest and serve humankind has not been deterred by his disability. He continues to be an active voice not only from the pulpit but from the heart of one who believes that love must be an action that is lived out daily. Bishop Jarman is an advocate for adult literacy, environmental activism, and the prevention of animal cruelty. Despite his disability and mobility issues, Bishop Jarman is now a Seminary student with the support of those who have encouraged him to gain higher education. Bishop Jarman is gifted to bring the best out of those he crosses paths with in life. His chief aim is to be well-pleasing unto God and share this sacred space known as the world in peace and harmony.
